Steven is a conductor, cellist, and music educator who works with musicians of all ages and backgrounds. Steven studied at Christopher Newport University, earning his degree in Music Education, and has attended conducting workshops at the College-Conservatory of Music at the University of Cincinnati and at the Peabody Conservatory.

Since 2013, Steven has served as the founding Music Director for the Hampton Roads Philharmonic and as conductor for Bay Youth Concert Orchestra since 2016. Throughout his career, he has also served as the Music Director for Tidewater Opera Initiative, conductor for Symphonicity's production of The Nutcracker, and conductor for Capitol Opera Richmond.

As a proponent of new music, Steven regularly commissions works and collaborates with composers. In 2010, he conducted the world premiere of *David and Glass*, an opera by Chris Lamb. Since then, he has conducted and performed in the premiere of over a dozen new works, including the 2016 concert premiere of *The Snow Maiden of Appalachia* by Andrew H. Austin.

Steven lives in Norfolk, Virginia, and teaches with The Academy of Music and Ghent Montessori School. He is a member of the National Association for Music Education, Omicron Delta Kappa, Pi Kappa Lambda, Alpha Chi and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia.

A Christmas Festival - Leroy Anderson (1908–1975)

Leroy Anderson has been described as a master of light orchestral music and A Christmas Festival is no exception. Consisting of 7 Christmas carols and Jingle Bells, this medley sets the scene of a delightful holiday experience. This work was completed in 1950, where it was premiered by the Boston Pops Orchestra in Boston, Massachusetts.

Toccata on "Carol of the Bells" - David Lovrien (b. 1963)

Starting off as the recognizable Christmas tune before delving into the dramatic antics of an orchestral work, David Lovrien's Toccata on "Carol of the Bells" is a modern take on the Ukrainian Christmas tune. Carol of the Bells was originally written in 1914 and was based off of a folk chant with the name Shchedryk, meaning "the generous one". Between 1919 and 1922, Carol of the Bells became widely popular in Europe and the Americas where it has remained a well-known Christmas tune to this day.

Lux Aurumque - Eric Whitacre (b. 1970)

Lux Aurumque, translated to "Light and Gold", was originally written in 2000 for a choir to be sung during the holiday season. The Latin name comes from a poem of the same name which, when translated, is "Light, warm and heavy as pure gold, and the angels sing softly to the newborn babe". In the words of Whitacre, "if the tight harmonies are carefully tuned and balanced they will shimmer and glow", referring to the delicate harmonies and orchestration techniques employed.

In the Bleak Midwinter - Arr. Robert W. Smith

In the Bleak Midwinter was originally written by poet Christina Rossetti and was first published in 1872. In 1906, composer Gustav Holst took the text of Rossetti's poem and composed a choral arrangement that is now performed around the world as a Christmas carol. This version of the classic carol, arranged by Robert W. Smith, begins with an epic opening fanfare followed by a beautiful solo clarinet voice. The countermelody of Smith's arrangement is taken from the American folk song Shenandoah, bringing a new and interesting twist to this well-known tune.

A Canadian Brass Christmas - Arr. Calvin Custer, Luther Henderson

Originally released in 1985 by the Canadian Brass, A Canadian Brass Christmas is an album consisting of 17 classic Christmas tunes. This rendition, arranged for orchestra by Luther Henderson, is a medley consisting of the tunes "Ding Dong! Merrily On High", "I Saw Three Ships", "The Huron Carol", and "Here We Come A'Wassailing", all stylized as if performed by the Canadian Brass.

Program Notes (cont.)

Sleigh Ride - Leroy Anderson

A standard in orchestral literature during the holiday season, *Sleigh Ride* gives musical imagery of riding a sleigh through town and engaging in other winter activities. Through the percussion, sounds reminiscent of a horse galloping and a whip cracking can be heard and, towards the end of the piece, the "horse" can be heard whin nying from the trumpet section.. Ironically enough, Leroy Anderson received the inspiration needed to begin composing this work during a heatwave in July of 1946. Since its release, *Sleigh Ride* has been performed countless times through settings ranging from orchestras to pop artist groups.

The Christmas Tree Ordeal
(The Maze of Ghoully Holiday Décor in the Attic)- Melvin Lauf, Jr. (b. 1972)

While serving her guests drinks and pastries, Miss Millie regaled them with their decoration happening. Miss Millie asked for some help from the neighborhood children to fetch the lavish and ornate Christmas decorations from the attic. little did they know that Miss Millie's impish husband placed Halloween decorations all about the attic, creating a frightening maze to the prized adornments. Nervous tension lurks around every corner. The children do, however, prevail in the end, and recover all the decorations for the happy couple. 'O Christmas Tree' is the musical basis of this scene with motifs from well known works of the macabre.

The Nutcracker Suite, Op. 71a - Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840–1893)

This suite, completed and premiered as a replacement for another of Tchaikovsky's works entitled *The Voyevoda*, is a collection of 8 selections from the ballet *The Nutcracker*. It was a grand success at its premiere in March of 1892, eight months ahead of the ballet's premiere in December of 1892, reportedly receiving an encore for nearly every number. Following the premiere, Tchaikovsky published the work for orchestras to perform worldwide.

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



